Our Youth! Shepherds Notes

When the announcements were read this past Wednesday night, concerning those who were sick and ill or having upcoming surgeries and Prayer requests for members who have lost loved ones. It felt like there are many things in the lives of our brothers and sisters that can make you feel a little depressed. But <u>No matter</u>, what we are going through at the time, we have a Savior who is there by our side. "*What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things?"* (Romans 8:31,32). Yes, in the mist of our most difficult times of life there is still so much to be Thankful for! For example, I am thankful that we continue to have many souls give their lives to Christ, and that God continues to increase the body here at W.S. Young, especially with the young people that were Baptized this year. Investing in today's youth is necessary in growing the body of Christ. Teaching young people in the church to grow in their relationship with the Lord prepares them to serve Christ in all they do now and in the future. As a result, this stimulates the congregation and edifies the church.

In the book of 2 Chronicles, Josiah was a leader in the kingdom. He was just eight years old when he became king of Judah. His father and grandfather, both kings before him, were evil kings. However, "he did that which was right in the sight of the Lord, and walked in the ways of David his father, and "*he did not turn aside to the right hand, nor to the left*" (34:2). He did what was right spiritually, and he turned the kingdom of God around with a spirited reformation. He is an example for youth to search for the truth and put it into practice, even as a young person in the church today. Although adults have the responsibility of leading, young people can be leaders, we ought never to forget that young people can shine as leaders in the church of today. For example, if you take the world's mentality of waiting until you are older, then several things are likely to happen:

- you will become cold and unconcerned.
- you will waste several years that you could have reached lost souls.
- you will help support this false notion that <u>only</u> older people can bear fruit for Christ.
- you will lose sight of the importance living by faith and the impact Christ should have in your life!

Don't wait. "whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away" (James 4:14). Young people continue to look for ways to serve Him and don't let anyone tell you that you can't! Ecclesiastes 12:1 – "Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, Before the difficult days come, And the years draw near when you say, "I have no pleasure in them." The Bible is full of wise men, who knew of the benefits of early commitment to God, I think that is the key. God can use the strength and enthusiasm of the young, youth is the most expedient time in life for the individual to commit to God's service. Dedication to the principles of righteousness early in one's life does not guarantee you will not make mistakes, but being young you are adaptable, susceptible to change, humble enough to admit mistakes and willing to learn. Greet With a Holy Kiss By Phil McIntosh

Perhaps some of us would be a little uncomfortable if we were to attend a worship service of the Lord's church in New Testament times. We might not immediately be "right at home" with some of the ceremonial or cultural differences regarding the manner or order in which various elements of the worship were performed (1 Cor 14:26-33). We certainly might not be accustomed to the frequency with which they would meet and spend time together (Acts 2:42; 46). However, the doctrinal truths would be the same since the foundation and the authority for teaching are the same (2 Tim 3:16). The largest difference might not be the experience as you were seated, but rather the experience as you were greeted. How would you respond in the moment if, as you approached the home where the church met, you were greeted with outstretched arms that held your face and kissed one cheek and then the other (1 These 5:26)? Would you reciprocate? Would you pull back? Admittedly, it would be quite strange for anybody steeped in American culture.

While America might not practice kissing as a greeting (at least in large part), that is not the same around the world. There are still cultures that practice a kiss as a greeting even to this day. In fact, I found one place that even divided the countries up who greet others with either one, two, or three kisses per cheek (according to one source, in Russia one gets three kisses, followed by a bear hug). One scholar said the Jews viewed a kiss as friendship. If you'll remember, Judas identified Jesus with a kiss after saying "Greetings, Rabbi" (Matt 26:48). Be that as it may, Americans don't usually greet each other that way. No, in America we extend our right hands, clasp them together, and squeeze a little. The handshake is a ubiquitous (everywhere and commonly known) sign of friendship and a kind, peaceful greeting. Handshakes have struggled some in our country over the past few years. The pandemic threw a wrench into the well-oiled machinery of the common American greeting. Some individuals still don't feel comfortable with touching others, and we should allow them their personal thoughts and respect their wishes, showing them a form of love and compassion in doing so. For those who don't mind clasping hands or hugging someone else, let me encourage you to follow the example Jesus set one day with a poor man in need.

After Jesus delivered His well-known "Sermon on the Mount" He descended from the mountain to go about His ministry. As He did, a man met Him and made a request. The man asked to be made clean. There were a variety of things that could cause a person living under the Law to be unclean. What made this man special in this circumstance was that he was a leper. Those afflicted with leprosy were to stand apart from others and announce "unclean" whilst also living alone, separated from society (*Lev 13:45-46*). Jesus then did something interesting. Jesus of course cleansed the man, but for us who believe in Jesus that is not surprising. What was surprising was *how* Jesus cleansed him:

> 'And, behold, there came a leper and worshipped him, saying, Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean. ^a And Jesus put forth his hand, and touched him, saying, I will; be thou clean. And immediately his leprosy was cleansed. ⁴And Jesus saith unto him, See thou tell no man; but go thy way, shew thyself to the priest, and offer the gift that Moses commanded, for a testimony unto them." **-Matthew 8:2-4**

What makes this interesting is that Jesus could have healed the man by simply speaking the affliction gone; there is evidence of Jesus doing just that elsewhere in the Bible (John 4:47-50). So why did Jesus touch him? I don't know. I cannot make you any guarantees, nor will I assume the intentions or thoughts of our Lord without His implication to or admission of such. However, does it not seem wonderful that Jesus took a man who had been a literal outcast, had been separated from society, and likely had not received a touch in quite some time, and He touched him? Sometimes people need to a loving, friendly touch like a handshake, a pat on the back, or even a hug when things aren't going well. There is still value to the human touch manifesting a greeting of friendship, camaraderie, or even comfort. If you're inclined to do so and the other party is willing and comfortable, greet each other with "our" version of the holy kiss and embrace them in a kind touch (Rom *16:16*).
