Do You Own a Salty Christianity?

Salt has been used in a variety of ways throughout the existence of human civilization, whether to effect some change, to preserve something, to alter the taste of one's food, or to be used in a metaphorical sort of way. To most of us salt usually refers to something we have sitting in the cabinet or out on the dinner table. For perhaps too many of us, salt is a necessity in our diet. Maybe that's a byproduct of us using salt for an extended period of time; we simply have altered our tastebuds and prefer salty foods. Certain foods just don't taste as good without salt. Growing up my grandmother would almost always have at least one watermelon in her house during the summer. She would bring it out, grab a large knife and cut it down the middle, and then set it on the table to be poked at and devoured by multiple spoons- only *after* it had been salted. For some, salt might be such a staple in their diet that they catch themselves (or someone else does and calls them out on it) salting food before they even taste it. Regardless of our dietary usage of it, the reality is that salt changes things.

Before we reference the Bible verses related to salt (which I hope are familiar to you) allow me to submit a quote by one of the past Presidents of the United States of America. Theodore Roosevelt is credited as having said, "No man is *worth his salt* who is not ready at all times to risk his well-being, to risk his body, to risk his life, in a great cause" (italics are mine to emphasis to our point). There have been many true and manufactured "great causes" in the long history of our world; but none of them rival the great cause of God- the liberation of the souls of mankind from the clutches of the Adversary. In fact, that's one of the reasons Jesus our Lord said that He came to this world (*Lk 19:10; Jn 10:10*). The phrase "worth his salt" in President Roosevelt's phrase is connected to the idea of capability, trustworthiness, and value. Collins Dictionary records that in British English is carries the idea of "efficient" or "worth one's pay." If a soldier (or teacher, first-responder, parent, etc.,) is "worth their salt" it means they are useful, active, and influential.

Could you carry the same idea into your reading of the words of the Savior? Jesus mentioned salt His "Sermon on the Mount" wherein He called His disciples the "salt of the earth" (*Matt 5:13*). In that verse, Jesus said that if the salt "loses its flavor" then it becomes "good for nothing." I suggest the meaning to be gleaned from that is there is a purpose for the disciples of Jesus, and they could ignore and might ultimately ruin that purpose and intended ability. What would that be? The power to effect change. Remember, salt changes things.

In another gospel account salt is again mentioned, conceivably later than the occurrence in the Sermon on the Mount since those events are told eight chapters earlier than this account (Lk 6). In the occurrence mentioned by Luke's account of the gospel, Jesus had just finished talking about a potential disciple of the need to "count the cost"

of whether or not they would be willing to give what was required to acquit themselves admirably and steadfastly as His followers (*Lk* 14:25-33). Jesus was telling them that being a disciple of the Lord Jesus was not always going to be easy and, in fact, could come at great cost. While Christians in the 21^{st} century are not in a situation similar to those who heard the words of Jesus that day, there is still a cost involved. The message of Jesus should still resonate todaythose wanting to be disciples of the Lord must choose between the Lord and the world (*Jms* 4:4). That said, let's look at the words of Jesus penned by Luke:

> "So likewise, whoever of you does not forsake all that he has cannot be My disciple. ³⁴ "Salt is good; but if the salt has lost its flavor, how shall it be seasoned? ³⁵ It is neither fit for the land nor for the dunghill, but men throw it out. He who has ears to hear, let him hear!"" -Luke 14:33-35

If, as we have already seen, salt's purpose is to effect change (whether in the individual's worth or impact on their surroundings or improving the taste of food) then what is to be done with the salt when it lacks those qualities? Jesus said to throw it out. If you had salt in your house that stopped being salty, you'd throw it out; it would be pointless to use salt that wasn't active anymore. The Christian's responsibility in this world is to allow God's word to effect change within their heart and then to go effect change in the world, affecting others with the light of Christ. Jesus warns that salt which stopped being salty has abandoned the very thing that makes it useful. Let us continue to motivate ourselves, both by reverence and responsibility to God, and also by fear that we would not be "worth our salt" when the Lord measures us on that final day, to stay connected to the source of change that can never lose His seasoning (Jn 8:31). Ensure by your obedience, faith, maturity, and activity that you are engaged in a salty Christianity, lest the time come that you are ineffective for the Lord and no longer useful for His service (1 Cor 15:58).


